Metro Wollongong Health Precinct

By 2030 it is expected that there will be more than 30,000 additional hospital admissions across the Illawarra, so Wollongong Hospital will have to expand its footprint. The Department of Planning and Environment will be developing the Metro Wollongong Health Precinct Strategy, which will help to identify ways to improve access



to Wollongong Hospital, to nearby medical facilities and better connect the health precinct with public transport and the CBD. The plan will also incorporate options for health worker housing. Community feedback and ideas will be sought later this year.

New **Ambulance** Station at **Fairy Meadow**

Construction is now underway on a new state-of-the-art ambulance station, which will be co-



located on at the University of Wollongong's Innovation Campus in Fairy Meadow. The station will feature internal parking for up to five emergency ambulance vehicles, a wash bay, administration and office areas, staff rest facilities, logistics and storage spaces. The new Fairy Meadow Ambulance Station is expected to be completed in early 2024, to provide additional services to the city's northern suburbs.

Kanahooka **Boat Ramp & Dix's Wharf**

Kanahooka boat ramp ietties and Dix's Wharf at Lake Heights have finally been repaired and re-opened to the public. The upgrades have bought these jetties to modern standards with the replacement of the timber



decks with non-slip mesh at Kanahooka and the construction of a new garden and green space at Dix's Wharf. Once again, residents and visitors in the Illawarra will be able to access these facilities and take advantage of the wonderful Lake Illawarra.

Warrawong Community Health Centre

Plans are progressing for the new Warrawong Community Health Centre to be built on the grounds of the Port Kembla Hospital. The new Warrawong Community Health Centre will bring together a range of services including community mental health, drug and alcohol, community nursing and child and family services, all working together to provide services in one purpose-built facility. This adds to a dedicated commitment to improve local health services for our region. Plans are expected to be lodged later this year with construction planned to start in 2024.

Berkeley Sports Club lighting upgrades

Recently the Berkeley Sports Club completed their lighting upgrades with funding from the NSW Government's Female Friendly Community Sports Facilities and Lighting Upgrade Fund in conjunction with money from the club itself and Wollongong City Council. Women's sporting teams, along with other grassroot sports, will be able to undertake late night training and competition games something they were unable to do previously across winter months.

Unanderra Station lifts delivered!

It took much longer than it should have but in June lifts were finally opened at Unanderra Station – ending the 72 step struggle to the platform forever!

One of the reasons I stood for election, and my first pledge, was to improve access to Unanderra Station so that everyone could get on a train at their local station.

Since my election I have campaigned alongside Rebecca Schmidt-Lachlan, Richard Kramer, the Unanderra Station Access Group, local unions, community groups and businesses to get lifts built.

I raised the lack of access for people with disability, the aged, people with mobility problems or people with strollers or bags multiple times on the floor of Parliament, in the media and with three different Premiers.

Together the community rallied, and time and time again called out the previous government for prioritising stations with far fewer passengers over the needs of our own.

And together we made enough noise for the previous Government to cave and fund the station upgrade.

Today when people arrive at Unanderra Station, they are greeted by a new modern pedestrian footbridge, three lifts to the platform and improved lighting and security.

What you won't find is the old footbridge – it is gone, never to return.

Thank you to everyone who, over more than a decade of campaigning signed a petition, attended a rally or wrote a letter supporting the lifts – we would not have achieved this without working together.
